Just recently Vijay suffered from a heart attack and post that he has been having issues related to high blood pressure which keeps him unfit. At such times using the Community Toilet Block feels burdensome, eats up a lot of time and is very unhygienic. When SA started their intervention in this settlement, Pawar family showed a lot of interest in being facilitated with a household toilet. While delivering the construction materials to this family, the children were the active members who took up the responsibility to receive the material as their parents could not afford to miss their work resulting in economic losses for those number of days due to absenteeism at work. Very promptly, their toilet stood ready and all of them have been using it since then. Within a house measuring 10'X8', a toilet of size- 3'6"X4' was constructed. "We thank you for the support, this would not have been possible without your help! Living in a small house, we thought it was not possible to get a toilet constructed, but you all helped us out in finding a solution tailored to our needs", expresses the couple on being facilitated with a household toilet under SA's 'One Home One Toilet' initiative.
